City's First Wheelchair Accessible Trail Opens in District Five

I am so proud to have the new "Jas Arnold Trail for All People" in District Five. The new trail is a 1,100-foot flat loop in the Black Mountain Ranch Open Space Park that is accessible for the elderly, young children and people with mobility challenges.

The trail is named after Jas Arnold, a Rancho Peñasquitos resident who lost his battle with Multiple Sclerosis earlier this year. Arnold was a vocal advocate of the trail who was heavily involved with the Black Mountain Open Space Park Citizens Advisory Committee and spent eight years working on the Trail for All People.

Arnold never wanted to let his illness get in the way of his passion for enjoying the beautiful scenery our City has to offer. This trail honors his vision and inspires us to never let our challenges keep us from something we truly love. I joined the Arnold family, Mayor Faulconer and members of the City's Accessibility Advisory Board to celebrate the grand opening on September 7.

The trail features four shade structures, benches, a trail head sign and educational displays about local plant life. Improvements to make the trail accessible for people with visual impairments, such as braille interpretive signs, are planned for the coming months. It is located off of Carmel Valley Road at the Miner's Ridge Loop Trailhead.

I encourage you to head out to the trail with the whole family to enjoy the easy terrain and expansive views. It is truly a gem in the City's park system.



Live Water Smart

Investments in drought-resilient water supplies mean the San Diego region has all of the water needed to sustain our \$222 billion economy and the quality of life for 3.3 million residents even after five years of drought, and we are no longer under emergency state mandates to reduce water use. But that doesn't mean we can waste water. In fact, making the most of every drop is always important in semi-arid San Diego County. That's why the San Diego County Water Authority and its 24 member agencies, including the City of San Diego, have launched the Live WaterSmart campaign just



Street Repairs in Rancho Peñasquitos

Repairs are currently being made by the City's Streets Division in Rancho Peñasquitos on Trail Dust Ave. and Roundup Ave. The limits of work will be Trail Dust Ave. from Old West Ave. to Roundup Ave. and Roundup Ave. from Trail Dust Ave. to Sidewinder Way. The asphalt on Trail Dust Ave. and Roundup Ave. will be resurfaced between these limits and curb ramps will be installed at the intersections of Roundup Ave. — Sidewinder Way and Trail Dust Ave — Old West Ave.

A portion of the road from approximately 13013 Trail Dust Ave. to 13030 Roundup Ave. will require more extensive road reconstruction, which is expected to be done later this month. This reconstruction work will impact access to residents' driveways/homes. Those who are affected have already been directly contacted. New Fire Crew in San Pasqual Speeds Up District Five Emergency Response Times



Great news for fire protection in our rural San Pasqual Valley. A brush fire engine with four firefighters began serving the area on July 1, providing the highest level of service the expansive rural area has ever received from the City. The crew is stationed at the County Fire Authority's San Pasqual Fire Station #93 – east of the San Diego Zoo Safari Park on San Pasqual Valley Road – at no land cost to the City. The crew is on duty 12 hours a day (8 a.m. to 8 p.m.) as fire officials determined that is the busiest time period for emergency requests in the area.

The closest fire station to San Pasqual Valley is Rancho Bernardo's Fire Station #33 – which has the largest territory of any station in the San Diego Fire-Rescue Department – and the City often relies on mutual-aid agreements with other fire agencies to respond to calls in the valley. Long response times in the area represent an increased risk to residents and visitors of the San Diego Zoo Safari Park when they experience a life-threatening emergency or when a structure fire or wildfire ignites.

This new brush crew provides critical coverage during the summer and fall when the risk of wild fires spikes. It also helps provide relief to our fire crews in Rancho Bernardo who often travel 15 minutes or more to respond to calls in San Pasqual.

I am grateful to the County and Cal Fire for their cooperation and partnership in helping make San Diego and the Fifth District a safer place to live and work.
