There is no excused absence, thus the generous policy for our volunteers. Secretary notes attendance at start of Zoom meeting, confirms all attendees still in attendance after each vote to note tally correctly.

#### CALL TO ORDER at 7:05 pm: Troy Van Horst, Chair.

General Announcements: Conduct at meetings follows City Council 600-24

Upcoming Elections. If we have enough open spots to seat everyone running, we can simply appoint all the candidates. Troy and Jeff Harasha are not re-running for their seats, Liz has resigned effective with this meeting, and Susan has resigned effective after the election. That leaves four seats open. We do need 10 people minimum. Eduardo will put together a notice for Nextdoor.com and the Del Mar Times to try and recruit some more candidates. (Available seats are highlighted in the member grid, above.)

#### I. Visiting Speakers

a. **Officer Briggs, SDPD**: Burglary series does seem to have stopped in the Northwestern area, but there still is an alert Countywide. There was a search warrant and arrest from a job site, and there was an arrest in another, unrelated burglary. There is a new potential Protect Act

so that in a traffic stop officers would not be able to question an intoxicated driver, would take away the minor infractions that permit stopping an automobile (broken lights, etc.). Officers no longer have the traffic cameras and license plate reader access. Please see the weblink provided, https://www.stopprotectact.com, for more information from the SDPD Association. The model ordinance PDF from that site is included at the end of these minutes. (Both Matt Griffith and Brian Elliott noted this is not currently scheduled to come to the council, so citizens should feel free to let their representatives know their feelings about the model ordinance language as it moves through the legislative process.) - California 78<sup>th</sup> District Assemblymember Christopher Ward, represented by Rachel Grandino. <u>Rachel.Granadino@asm.ca.gov</u>, District office 619-645-3090, <u>https://a78.asmdc.org</u>
  - Not Present. Please see provided attached information after these minutes. The provided document was posted to the chat during the meeting.
- b. California State Senator Toni Atkins, represented by Cole Reed, Cole.Reed@sen.ca.gov, https://sd39.senate.ca.gov
  - Not Present. Please see provided attached information after these minutes. The provided document was posted to the chat during the meeting.
- c. San Diego County District 3 Supervisor Terra Lawson-Remer, represented by Jeff Yuen, <u>Jeffrey.yuen@sdcounty.ca.gov</u>, www.supervisorterralawsonremer.com
  - Passed a policy looking at senior homelessness, top priority, currently the fastest growing segment, and already represent 25% of homelessness. By identifying vulnerable seniors and provide small rental stipends, even as little as \$300 a month can keep them housed (as compared to a shelter bed which has a \$6K/month price tag). Jeffrey will have an update on the pilot in May.
  - Local, sustainable produce for locally-provided government meals is another policy that's now also coming into play.
- d. San Diego City District 1 Councilmember Joe LaCava, represented by Brian Elliott, <u>BElliott@sandiego.gov</u>. New rep: Krissy Chan, <u>chank@sandiego.gov</u>, 619-310-4450, Office hours TBD
  - Addressing street repairs and Dennis' question in an earlier discussion, large scale building projects do require the repair of streets up to the median when they dig into the streets. Brian will look into the requirements for smaller projects, as well as the upcoming school rebuilds.
  - North of DMH, including racetrack drive, the streets would get a full slurry resurface at EOY (calendar).
  - Penasquitos Lagoon restoration was at committee this morning, and the engineering contract is moving forward. (A document provided by the City DSD was sent to Troy via email, and posted to the chat, attached here at the end of the minutes.

- Undergrounding of utilities in Del Mar Terrace: The delay started with the SDG&E franchise agreement, and then all MUA terms were revised. Undergrounding MUA were also just reapproved. However, timeline of projects currently underway or very close have been adjusted. SDG&E is doing 10 projects, and then tackling the old list. This area is on that list, and the councilmembers office is keeping a close eye on this.
- Brian is moving on to new responsibilities, introduced Krissy Chan, a policy advisor who just graduated from SIO.
- e. San Diego City Office of the Mayor, represented by Matt Griffith, <u>GriffithM@sandiego.gov</u>)
  - Please continue to use Get It Done as the city uses that data to validate and prioritize the tasks that need to be done, in particular as they address the backlog of work.
  - Segment of street not yet repaved, Bahama Cove and related intersections. Joshua Lahmann from the City reported. When street repaving is done, the curbs must also be brought up to current ADA crossings. As this location also has a drainage, a design project is being opened so they can be designed before the repaving happens. In fiscal 2024 we should have full funding for construction. Design, which does take about a year, will be quickly funded so the process can get started. Tony Grover noted this area is part of the path to school, and there are also some significant potholes, and the incline is quite steep. Joshua noted the steep incline is part of why this is a challenging process. Both Matt and Joshua asked the Get It Done reports be forwarded so they can check on the status.
  - Questions from Dennis Ridz as to whether the damage created by the homeowner who remodels or builds is responsible for the damage their construction creates (this used to be the case, covered by a bond the homeowner posted). Matt will get back to us.
  - Dennis notes 14141 Boquito Drive has had a streetlight out for about 14-15 months and there have been at least two falls as a result, including Dennis.
  - Sheryl Adams on Mira Montana Drive, south of Del Mar Heights, noting that this road continues to await the rip and replace of that road. The repair seems to appear on and off lists over the last four years. Joshua noted this was in conflict with another construction project, and the repaving cannot be done until that closes, shortly, so it should be mid-year. Matt and Sheryl will be in touch to see if we can get an update on this street.

### IV. Consent Agenda (from Project Review Committee meeting)

 PTS#691451 Digi-Sheres Residence CDP/SDP TORREY PINES (Process 3) Coastal Development Permit and Site Development Permit to demolish an existing 2-story, single family residence and construct a new 2-story, 4,822-sf, single family residence with attached garage and one-story, 719-sf ADU for a total of 5,541-sf located at 2442 Mango Way. The 0.35-acre site has ESL and is in the RS-1-6 Zone, Coastal (Non-Appealable) Overlay Zone, and Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone within the Torrey Pines Community Plan area, and Council District 1. MOTION made to approve the project in full, seconded, and approved, 10-0.

a. San Diego River Park CAC, AN SDG&E slide deck was provided, and is attached to the end of these minutes, we did not discuss, would like to invite the presenter to come to our meeting.

Jim reported a proposal was made to ban all e-bikes from bike trails (as motorcycles are), but as no one had anticipated this, there was not a vote. A class 1 ebike is a pedal assist, class 2 can be all motor.

**MOTION** made to give Jim our full support to vote as he sees fit in these meetings, and report back to our board, passed 10-0.

b. CPC report from Eduardo. Meetings with Joe LaCava and new rules are going to come from the City. It appeared that he supported many of the questions and concerns, certainly heard all the feedback, and he now goes back to Council. Brian provided a <u>link to the current redlined documents</u> in the chat. One concern is that the councilmembers may not be required provide a staff member, but Councilmember La Cava has assured us they will continue to attend.

**MOTION** to extend for the last two reports, passed 9-0. (Jake left meeting.)

- c. Rail realignment, SANDAG last presented some time ago, and Eduardo is asking that they reattend and update us. It does appear they may be considering other options.
- d. We do someone to cover CSA17. Troy is going to get a little more background so we can line someone up next meeting.

#### MODEL ORDINANCE RE: PREVENTING OVERPOLICING THROUGH EQUITABLE COMMUNITY TREATMENT (PROTECT)

#### I. Purpose

Research has shown that Black and Brown people in the City of San Diego are more likely to be subjected to discretionary stops and searches by the San Diego Police Department (SDPD), which has also disproportionately searched individuals with disabilities and individuals officers perceived to be LGBT or Gender Non-Conforming. Raising the standard for how and when police can stop and search people is an important step to take to ensure everyone's rights to move about freely in public spaces, regardless of race, ethnicity, nationality, disability, sexual orientation or immigration status are respected. This law is intended to address one set of tactics used by police that contribute to the over-policing of Black and Brown people, and to help prevent other forms of biased policing.

#### II. Policy Recommendation

We recommend adding Section 82.00 to Article 2 of the San Diego Municipal Code to read:

#### § 82.00 Avoidance of Biased Policing

#### **Legislative Findings and Intent**

- (a) The Council finds that the United States and California Constitutions emphasize the protection of individuals' fundamental rights, including but not limited to the rights to equal protection and freedom of movement.
- (b) The Council finds that racial or identity profiling and subjecting people to stops or searches without probable cause undermine effective police work by eroding public trust in the police and making the public less willing to report crimes, provide tips, or otherwise cooperate with law enforcement.
- (c) The Council finds that there are common misperceptions about appropriate justifications for stops and searches. The Council declares that factors such as an individual's mere "nervousness," "presence in a high-crime neighborhood," prior contact with law enforcement, criminal record, inclusion in a so-called "gang database," suspicion of gang involvement, or attempts to avoid police do not provide sufficient bases for believing that the individual is engaged in criminal activity. This list is not exhaustive.
- (d) The Council intends that officers shall be responsible for treating every member of the public that they interact with in a fair, equitable, and objective manner, in accordance with the law and regardless of the individual's actual or perceived race, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, religion, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, or mental or physical disability, or any other identifiable group characteristic. While conducting a stop, arrest, or search, officers are expected to treat the individual they are interacting with in a courteous and considerate manner, while providing for their safety and security. Failure to do so can escalate the interaction, increasing the risk of violence and further eroding public trust.

(e) The Council intends this section to create protections and rights greater than those guaranteed by federal or state law. Nothing in this section shall be construed to diminish protections and rights guaranteed by federal or state law or conflict with requirements of state or federal law to which the City of San Diego is subject as a charter city.

#### **Definitions**

- (f) For purposes of this section, "racial or identity profiling" is defined as the consideration of, or reliance on, to any degree, actual or perceived race, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, religion, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, or mental or physical disability in deciding which persons or property to contact, address, speak with, interview, search, seize, or subject to any other law enforcement activity, except that an officer may consider or rely on characteristics listed in the specific description of a particular person in conducting a search or seizure otherwise allowed by this section or other applicable law.
- (g) For purposes of this section, "officer" means San Diego Police Department officer and any other peace officer and/or code enforcement officer under the jurisdiction of the City of San Diego.

#### **Prohibition of Racial or Identity Profiling**

(h) Officers are prohibited from engaging in racial or identity profiling, including but not limited to in the course of stopping any person or vehicle; asking any questions or engaging in any encounters; searching or seizing any person or property; removing vehicle occupants during a traffic stop; issuing a citation; or making an arrest.

#### **Restrictions on Search and Seizure**

- (i) Except as otherwise provided in this section, officers are prohibited from asking any person, including but not limited to persons who are on probation, parole, post-release community supervision, or any other court order or status that waives or limits a person's Fourth Amendment right, for identification or for any information about: any person's identity; probation, parole, post-release community supervision status, or any other court order or status that waives or limits a person's Fourth Amendment right; post-release community supervision status, or any other court order or status that waives or limits a person's Fourth Amendment right; outstanding warrants; or participation in any criminal or other activity. This subsection does not, however, prohibit an officer from asking for identification if there is probable cause that the person stopped has committed, is committing, or is about to commit a crime, or from asking about a specific crime if the officer has probable cause that the subject of the inquiry has committed, is committing, or is about to commit that crime.
- (j) Except as required by any state or federal law to which the City of San Diego is subject as a charter city, officers are prohibited from stopping any person, including but not limited to persons who are on probation, parole, post-release community supervision, or any other court order or status that waives or limits a person's Fourth

Amendment rights, unless there is probable cause that the person stopped has committed, is committing, or is about to commit a crime.

- (k) Notwithstanding subsection (j), officers are prohibited from stopping any person solely on the basis of violations based on the vehicle's equipment, license plates, or registration, including but not limited to: expired registration; failure to have a light illuminating a license plate; defective and unsafe equipment; absence of functional taillights, headlights, turn signals, brake lights or a high mount stop light; absence of an exhaust system that prevents excessive or unusual levels of noise; having sunshading materials and/or tinting films; or having objects suspended in the vehicle.
- (1) When an officer stops a person, the officer is prohibited from extending the duration of the stop beyond the time necessary for investigating the specific offense for which the person was stopped, unless there is probable cause that the person stopped has committed, is committing, or is about to commit a crime other than the offense for which such person was stopped, in which case the officer may extend the duration of the stop for the time necessary to investigate that specific offense.
- (m) While conducting a stop, officers are prohibited from questioning the person stopped about any offense other than an offense for which the person was stopped, unless there is probable cause that the person stopped has committed, is committing, or is about to commit a crime other than the offense for which such person was stopped.
- (n) While conducting a stop, officers are prohibited from conducting a check to determine whether there are outstanding warrants for the stopped person or any individual accompanying the stopped person. Officers are additionally prohibited from conducting a check to determine whether the stopped person or any individual accompanying the stopped person is on probation, parole, or post-release community supervision, or subject to any other court order or status that waives or limits a person's Fourth Amendment rights.
- (o) Officers are prohibited from searching a person without probable cause that the person is armed and dangerous.
- (p) Officers are prohibited from searching a vehicle without probable cause that the vehicle contains contraband or evidence of a crime.
- (q) Officers shall not request consent to search any person, vehicle, residence, or other real or personal property. This provision shall apply equally to a temporary or permanent residence.
- (r) Officers shall not conduct any stop or search based on a person's consent.
- (s) Officers shall not conduct any stop or search based on any condition of probation, parole, sentence, post-release community supervision, or any other court order or status that waives or limits a person's Fourth Amendment rights.
- (t) Unless required under the DNA Act or pursuant to a court order or search warrant, officers are prohibited from collecting a buccal swab sample or any other biological sample from a minor without first obtaining written consent of the minor and approval of the minor's consent by a parent, legal guardian, or attorney, as specified in Section 625.4 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.

- (u) Nothing in this section shall prohibit officers from approaching or communicating with a person solely for the purpose of offering assistance, determining if assistance is needed, or summoning assistance in case of illness or injury, substantial risk of serious injury to a person or animal, or a disabled or inoperative motor vehicle.
- (v) Nothing in this section shall prohibit officers from asking for identifying information from a person reported as missing or from a witness to or victim of a crime.

#### **Documenting and Explaining Stops**

- (w) Officers must document the reasons for all stops and searches in detail, without using conclusory or boilerplate language. The documentation must include an explanation of the specific and objective facts that caused the officer to believe the stop or search was justified. Upon request of a person who was stopped or searched by an officer, SDPD must provide a copy of this documentation to such person within 10 days of the stop or search. If requested by another person, SDPD must also provide such information on request within 10 days of the stop or search, but in responding to a request other than from the person stopped or searched, SDPD must redact information that could be used to identify the person who was stopped or searched.
- (x) The documentation referred to in subsection (w) shall not be placed in any file containing "personnel records" as defined in Penal Code Section 832.8. Such documentation must be provided on request even if SDPD might otherwise be authorized to claim it is exempt from disclosure, under the California Public Records Act, Govt. Code §§ 6250-6277, except to the extent that SDPD shall redact identifying information as provided in subsection (r).
- (y) Officers must explain the reason for any stop or search to the person stopped or searched, or the owner or occupant of any vehicle searched, as soon as practicable, and before asking for identification or asking any questions about the stopped person's activities.
- (z) By January 1, 2022, the City shall develop an informational card that can be provided to persons who are stopped to inform them of their rights during a stop, and must furnish copies of these cards to SDPD, with versions translated into the same languages that the San Diego County Registrar of Voters uses to fulfill its duties under the California Elections Code to prepare facsimile ballots. Starting no later than March 1, 2022, SDPD officers shall provide a copy of this informational card to every person they stop, in that person's preferred language. The officer must provide and read the card to the person they stop as soon as practicable, and before asking for identification or asking any questions about the stopped person's activities. The officer is prohibited from asking any questions until the person has had sufficient time to read and understand the card.
- (aa) The informational card ("Card") provided pursuant to subsection (z) shall be attached to a form ("Form") that the officer shall use to provide the documentation required pursuant to subsection (w). The Card and Form shall both have the same incident number, which the person who has been stopped can use to request the

documentation required pursuant to subsection (w). The Card shall inform the stopped individual:

- 1. That they have the right to request and receive documentation of the reasons they were stopped;
- 2. Of the appropriate email address, website, phone number, and incident number the individual may use to request the documentation required pursuant to subsection (w)
- 3. That they have the right to remain silent and are not required to answer any questions about: where they are going; where they are traveling from; what they are doing; or where they live;
- 4. That the officer is prohibited from inquiring into, and the individual should not answer, questions about their immigration or citizenship status;
- 5. That the officer will not request permission, and is not permitted to request permission, to search their person or vehicle;
- 6. That they have the right to file a complaint if they believe any of their rights have been violated.

#### **Enforcement**

- (bb) This section imposes a mandatory duty on all officers to avoid engaging in the practices prohibited in subsections (h)-(t) and to perform the duties required by this section.
- (cc) Any violation of any subsection from (h)-(t) constitutes an injury and any person may institute and prosecute in their own name and on their own behalf or that of their ward or minor child a civil action in any court of competent jurisdiction for damages as well as for injunctive relief, writ of mandate, or other appropriate equitable relief to enforce this section or protect the peaceable exercise or enjoyment of the right or rights secured by this section,
- (dd) A court shall award costs and reasonable attorneys' fees to any plaintiff who is the prevailing party in an action brought to enforce this section.
- (ee) In addition, where a court determines there has been a violation of any subsection from (h)-(t), the plaintiff will be awarded actual damages but in no case less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per violation, to be paid by the City of San Diego. This award is independent of and in addition to any funds the plaintiff may recover through any other claims arising from the same incident.
- (ff) Any violation of any subsection from (h)-(t) is a misdemeanor.

#### **Reporting and Auditing**

(gg) Beginning January 1, 2022, San Diego Police Department ("SDPD") shall annually furnish to the Commission on Police Practices ("CPP") all data necessary to produce a report documenting compliance with this section. CPP shall produce such a report annually, and provide it to the San Diego City Council within three months of receiving the data. The report shall:

- 1. Include a copy of the report SDPD is required to furnish to the California Department of Justice in order to comply with the Racial Identity and Profiling Act of 2015, including Government Code section 12525.2 ("Report");
- 2. Document all instances when any civilian has filed a complaint or claim alleging a violation of this section;
- 3. For each incident reported under subdivision (y)(2), the information reported to the City Council shall indicate what action, if any, was taken in response to the complaint or claim, redacting information that could identify the officer(s) and/or complainant(s)/claimant(s);
- 4. Document the number of complaints and/or claims that have been filed during the year for violations or alleged violations of this section;
- 5. Document the number of individual officers who have been accused of violating this section;
- 6. Document the number of complaints and/or claims filed by zip code and police beat number and name;
- 7. Document, where known, the race, color, ethnicity, national origin, age, religion, gender identity or expression, sexual orientation, or mental or physical disability of the person who filed the complaints and/or claims; and
- 8. Provide statistical data demonstrating the outcome of the complaints or claims.

SDPD shall redact all reports and documentation provided pursuant to this subsection to avoid providing personal information, including but not limited to names and social security numbers, that may tend to identify any person.

(hh) Beginning June 1, 2022, the City Auditor shall provide an annual audit of SDPD's compliance with this section and present a report with findings to the City Council.

#### **Severability**

The provisions in this section are severable. If any part or provision of this section, or the application of this section to any person or circumstance, is held invalid, the remainder of this section, including the application of such part or provisions to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected by such holding and shall continue to have force and effect.

I hope this email finds you well and getting ready to enjoy a relaxing long weekend. Unfortunately, I will be unable to attend tonight's meeting however I am attaching my report below.

Assemblymember Ward returned to Sacramento on January 3rd, where our team in the Capitol is helping to begin our new legislative session. On January 31st there was a deadline in the legislature for two year bills to pass the assembly and Assemblymember Ward did get his bill passed on that deadline. The bill is AB 311 which is our ghost gun bill, it made sure that we closed the loophole that was still available at the Del Mar Fairgrounds to sell ghost guns. The County and City of San Diego had already passed their own measures to stop the sale of ghost guns, and since the Fairgrounds are state land, they would have been exempt. And this bill looks to address that. It is now on its way to the Senate. He also reintroduced AB 1640 to establish Regional Climate Networks. It would provide the ability for regions to form networks empowered to convene, receive, and apply for funds and prioritize adaptation projects. This bill will be first heard in March.

Another important piece of legislation is the new COVID-19 Supplemental Paid Sick Leave which recently passed the Assembly. This bill is retroactive to January 1, 2022, and will require employers to provide two weeks of paid sick leave through to September 30 2022 to all employees. It would help employees who were affected by the recent omicron wave, still get paid for the period of time where they needed to either care for themselves or their family members and were unable to work. The bill is was signed by Governor Newsom last week.

Additionally, Assemblymember Ward has two new roles in the State Assembly. He has now been added as a member of the Assembly Housing Committee and he was also named the new Assistant Majority Leader. He looks forward to how he can be of service to advocate for Assembly District 78 in this new role.

Lastly, on January 18th we hosted a virtual town hall with Lieutenant Governor Kounalakis. Assemblymember Ward and the Lt. Governor addressed a wide variety of topics including higher education, climate and the California Budget. It has now been uploaded to our social media and our website if you were unable to join us.

#### Woman of the Year Nominations

#### Early Budget Items

- Wednesday, February 9<sup>th</sup> Two early budget bills, SB 113 and SB 114, were signed into law by Governor Newsom.
- Thursday, February 10<sup>th</sup> Another early budget bill, SB 115, was also signed into law.
- SB 113 provides \$6.1 billion in relief for small businesses. This includes nearly \$500 million in tax cuts for restaurants and shuttered venues, \$5.5 billion in restored tax deductions and tax credits, and \$150 million towards COVID-19 relief grants to help fund to fund remaining eligible waitlisted grant applicants.
- SB 114 ensures that employees have access to up to two weeks of COVID-19 supplemental paid sick leave through September 30, 2022. This legislation extends previous supplemental paid sick leave which expired last fall and will be retroactive to January 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022. Small businesses employing 25 or fewer workers are exempt.
- SB 115 invests \$1.9 billion to boost California's COVID-19 response needs. Major items include almost \$600 million to boost statewide testing capacity, \$486 million to address hospital and medical surge infrastructure, almost \$400 million towards enhancing vaccine distribution and administration efforts.

#### **DMV Announcement**

- Monday, January 24<sup>th</sup> The DMV announced that they are now allowing people to opt into receiving paperless vehicle registration renewal notices through email as part of the department's efforts to expand digital services and reduce its carbon footprint. In addition, people currently have the option of receiving their driver's license renewal notices by email.
