

A community plan is a public document which contains specific proposals for future land uses and public improvements in a given community. A community plan is part of the City's <u>General Plan</u>. It provides community-specific **goals**, tailored **policies** and a long-range physical development guide for elected officials and citizens engaged in community development.





WHAT THE COMMUNITY PLAN DOES DO

- It provides community-specific goals, tailored policies, and a longrange physical development guide for City staff, decisionmakers, property owners, and citizens engaged in community development.
- It establishes goals and policies to address land use, conservation, mobility, urban design, open space, and public facilities.
- As a component of the City of San Diego's General Plan, it is a longterm blueprint for the future and provides location-based goals, policies, and recommendations.





WHAT THE COMMUNITY PLAN DOES NOT DO

- It does not mandate growth. The community plan provides options and opportunities for new housing and employment. It does not require property owners to redevelop or mandate that development will happen.
- It is not a maintenance document. The community plan is a longrange policy and regulatory document that identifies future infrastructure needs. It is not a plan to address the deferred maintenance of existing infrastructure.
- It does not approve specific projects. The community plan establishes policy and regulatory direction—all future projects will still go through an approval process.

To provide the public facilities and services needed to serve the existing population and new growth.





GENERAL PLAN PUBLIC FACILITIES, SAFETY, & SERVICES ELEMENT







EXISTING UCP GOALS: SAFETY

- Protect the public health and safety by guiding future development so that land use is compatible with identified geologic risks, including seismic and landslide hazards.
- Ensure that proposed development does not create or increase geologic hazards either on- or off-site.
- Promote public safety by taking into account aircraft accident potential in the placement of structures and activities.
- Provide for the safe operation of MCAS Miramar through the preservation of appropriate departure corridors.





- Develop and maintain a public school system that will enable all students to realize their highest potential. Pursue the realization of integrated residential neighborhoods to achieve an integrated school system.
- Provide a high level of service in police and fire protection.
- Encourage the multipurpose use of existing community and private facilities.









WHAT IS A.... VISION, GUIDING PRINCIPLE, GOAL, & POLICY?









Vision

A vision statement describes the desired future state of the community through the implementation of the Community Plan.





Guiding Principles Guiding principles are core principles that represent the long-term priorities of the Community Plan. They are either standalone statements or woven into the fabric of the plan.





Goals

Goals are succinct statements that identify a desired future state of the community. Goals are broad enough to be widely applicable, but specific enough to identify priorities. Goals are what a plan hopes to accomplish and provides direction for decisions.





Policies

Policies are rules or actions which implement the goals. They are specific statements with a call to action to achieve the desired goals.





- Focus on writing succinct language keep it simple, but brief.
- Avoid writing too many goals and too few policies.
- Remember there are often multiple policies under one goal.

A community well-served by public facilities that promote neighborhood health, safety, and livability.





A system of public facilities that are accessible

by transit, located near or within mixed use

development, are technologically equipped,

and environmentally sustainable.





A healthy, safe, and livable community that reduces the risk posed by fire, flooding, hazardous materials, geologic and seismic hazards, and extreme temperatures.
